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# Portland Home Market: October 2006

## **October Residential Highlights**

Temperatures may be dropping outside, but the number of new listings continues climb when comparing October 2006 to October 2005. New listings increased 20.8%. On the other hand, the number of closed sales fell 14.3%. Further, pending sales decreased 12.6%. As a result, inventory also climbed. At the end of October, there were 11,533 listings in the Portland Metro area. Given the month's rate of sales, they would last approximately 4.6 months.

## **Appreciation**

Comparing the average sale price of the 12 months ending in October 2006 to the 12 previous, the average sale price appreciated 15% (\$318,200 v. \$276,600). Using the same date range, median sale price increased16.2% (267,900 v. 230,500).

## Year-to-Date

New listings increased 14.9% when comparing January-October 2006 with January-October 2005. However, pending sales decreased 14.3% and closed sales fell 12.6%.

#### **Affordability**

Per a National Association of Realtors (NAR) formula, Portland homes are now affordable again thanks to a slight dip in median sales price and interest rates in the third quarter. A family making the area's median annual income (\$66,900 per HUD) made 1% more than required to afford a median priced home (\$275,500) with a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage at Freddie Mac's average rate (6.4%) and a 20% down payment.

# Long-Term Mortgages Rates Drop for Fifth Week in a Row

## **November 30, 2006**

<u>Freddie Mac</u> released the results of its Primary Mortgage Market Survey (PMMSSM) in which the 30-year fixed-rate mortgage (FRM) averaged 6.14 percent with an average 0.4 point for the week ending November 30, 2006, down from last week when it averaged 6.18 percent. Last year at this time, the 30-year FRM averaged 6.26 percent. This is the lowest the 30-year FRM has been since the week ending January 26, 2006, when it averaged 6.12 percent.

The 15-year FRM this week averaged 5.87 percent with an average 0.4 point, down from last week when it averaged 5.91 percent. A year ago, the 15-year FRM averaged 5.81 percent. This is the lowest the 15-year FRM has been since the week ending February 2, 2006 when it averaged 5.81 percent

Five-year Treasury-indexed hybrid adjustable-rate mortgages (ARMs) averaged 5.95 percent this week, with an average 0.5 point, down from last week when it averaged 5.99 percent. A year ago, the five-year ARM averaged 5.76 percent. This is the lowest the 5-year ARM has been since the week ending March 16, 2006, when it averaged 5.93 percent.

One-year Treasury-indexed ARMs averaged 5.46 percent this week with an average 0.7 point, down from last week when it averaged 5.49 percent. At this time last year, the one-year ARM averaged 5.16 percent.

(Average commitment rates should be reported along with average fees and points to reflect the total cost of obtaining the mortgage.)

#### **Freddie Mac Economist**

"Mortgage rates drifted lower this week, bringing long-term rates to levels below those of this time last year," said Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac vice president and chief economist. "Mortgage applications for home purchase in November have remained healthy, due largely because of the drop in mortgage rates and a softening in home prices in some areas."

## **Portland Area Mortgage Rates**

The average APR for a 30-year fixed rate mortgage was 5.860% for the Portland metro area, the low was 5.470%, and the high was 6.790%. All rates are for a loan with 20% down. In early December the following lenders and mortgage brokers were offering these rates:

- Virtual Bank: Rate of 5.25 for a 30-year FRM (APR of 5.704%) and zero points.
- <u>US Bank</u>: Rate of 6.250% for a 30-year FRM (APR of 6.389%) and zero points.

## Portland Weather

#### November 2006 Sets a Record for Rainfall

The National Weather Service announced on Sunday, November 26th that November set a record of 11.61 inches of rain recorded at Portland International Airport. The previous November record was set in 1942, with 11.57 inches. On Monday, an arctic front laden with snow showers hit Portland, dusting the hills above 500 feet. Then the last few days of November turned dry, and we have been without rain for 5-6 days.

Other records that were broken during November 2006 include:

- November 5<sup>th</sup>- daily maximum rainfall of 1.12 inches broke the old record of 1.01 inches set in 1999.
- November 6<sup>th</sup> daily maximum rainfall of 2.53 inches broke the old record of 1.31 inches set in 1980.
- November 6<sup>th</sup> Record high temperature of 68 degree broke the old record of 67 degrees set in 1980.
- November 7<sup>th</sup> daily maximum rainfall of .94 inches broke the old record of .91 inches set in 1980.

The last two weeks of November brought tons of snow in the Cascades where 4-5 feet has fallen. Timberline Lodge, just below Mount Hood, has 66 inches of the white stuff already. Oregon's snowpack is already at 128 percent of average, and Washington's is 181 percent of average, the two highest snowpacks in the western United States.

- Average Minimum Temperature: 42.3.
- Highest Temperature: November 6 with 68.0.
- Lowest Temperature: November 27 with 29.
- Average Monthly Wind Speed: 9.9 MPH.
- Clear/Cloudy Days: 7 clear days, 12 partly cloudy days, and 11 cloudy days.

# **Oregon Wines**



The Oregon wine industry is comprised of over 300 wineries and 500 vineyards. Close to 200 of those are estate wineries - wineries who have their own vineyards and produce wines from those vineyards. Oregon's climate, as well as its location along the 45th North Latitude, models that of Burgundy, a region of France known for its Burgundy (Pinot Noir) wines.

Oregon has six officially recognized appellations, or growing regions. As defined by federal law, each appellation is host to a unique set of growing conditions, which include soil quality, mineral content, and precipitation levels.

The largest appellation is the Willamette Valley, a fertile river valley located in the northwest end of the state, and which is also home to two-thirds of Oregon's population. Wet and mild, with warm summer temperatures, varietals grown here include Pinot Noir, Pinot Gris, Chardonnay, and Riesling.

#### **International Pinot Noir Conference**

Over the past twenty years, the <u>International Pinot Noir Conference</u> (IPNC) has grown from the brainchild of a group of Oregon winemakers and wine lovers into an event that was cited by The Wine Advocate's Pierre Rovani as "unquestionably the finest in the world." The event has inspired people to come from all corners of the earth for three days of seminars, tastings, tours, and one-of-a-kind meals with 60 international Pinot noir winemakers. Each year, a different group of winemakers are invited.

The IPNC is as well known for its food as for its wine. Chefs from the Pacific Northwest create food to accompany the wines on the campus of Linfield College in McMinnville, Oregon.

## Homes

## The Inventory of Homes Builds in Portland. Is this a Trend?

Many Realtors say that when the inventory of homes will last 5-6 months, its becomes a "buyer's market." Notice the gradual build up of homes for sale during the last few months. In July it was 3.5 months. In August, the number edged up slightly to 3.6 months. The big swing came in September's when the inventory jumped to 4.5 months. In October, the 11,299 active residential listings at month's end would last approximately 4.6 months. If November figures hit five months, we'll know for certain that the market has changed.

## **Average and Median Prices are Slowly Decreasing**

Both the average and median prices have been in a slow decline since June. The average price of a residential home was \$322,900 in October whereas it was \$331,900 in June. The average price for June, July, August, and September varied only by a few dollars. The large dip came in October when the price declined for almost \$10,000. In October, the median price dropped by \$4,500 from September.

Again, the November figures will tell us if we are in a downward spiral. If so, this will authenticate all the prognosticators who kept claiming all during 2006 that the Portland market was overprice and due for an adjustment. There are advantages to a market adjustment, however, because more people will be able to buy a home.
